Most Eagle Scout service projects help a local school, church, or community. Skylar and Griffin Moore decided to act globally as well as locally, and collected and donated resources to the "baby houses" or orphanages in Kazakhstan from which they were adopted as infants.

The two first visited their baby homes in 2019 with their mother, Susan, and got the chance to meet the caregivers and doctors who cared for them. While there, the two said they noticed several needs, including the fact that the cribs were the same ones Griffin slept in as a baby more than a decade ago.

The two Scouts started planning separate fundraisers to purchase cribs and other needed items. Griffin organized a fun run at Camp Mabry while Skylar hosted a garage sale at home with more than 1,000 items donated by friends and neighbors. Together, the events raised \$3,700.

With funds in hand, Griffin and Skylar and their mom made the 6,800 mile flight back to Kazakhstan. With the help of a translator, the siblings worked with the baby homes to find out exactly what resources they needed. Skylar used her funds to buy new clothes, developmental games, monitors for the staff members, and musical instruments for the children. Griffin bought 20 new beds, including ten cribs for the infants. **"I actually got to see a baby sleeping in one of the cribs that I had provided them with**. So that was pretty cool," Griffin said with a smile.

Griffin is a member of Scouts BSA Troop 5 and Skylar is a member of Scouts BSA Troop 50. Our council is proud to support both units as their chartering organization.





Scouting's adventure knows no bounds. Neither does First Class Scout Finley McKeag of Scouts BSA Troop 280.

"... he's the only one [in his troop] with a physical disability," Finley's mother Dawn McKeag said. "At the same time, we don't let that stop him."

12-year-old Finley has a condition that impacts his ability to walk. But he has gone kayaking, scuba diving, and enjoyed other outdoor activities the same as any of his friends in the troop. He recently earned Camping Merit Badge, something that's required on the trail to earn the prestigious rank of Eagle Scout. The merit badge requires several challenges, including a five-mile hike. But with the use of a special wheelchair, Finley was able to complete the task.

Ask Finley what he enjoys most about Scouting and he'll give you several answers, not the least of which are the opportunities for adventure and friendship. "I'm just happy I get to explore at an early age so that I can figure out what I want to do with my life," Finley said.

In addition to being active in Scouting, Finley has competed in rugby, basketball, tennis, and track and field. "My hope will probably be to become a Paralympian," Finley said. "But for now, I'm just doing all these different sports so that I can get that experience."

Josh Haney is a Den Leader with Cub Scout Pack 82. But more than that, he's a proud Scouting parent. He shared this story about how Scouting has helped his son grow a lot in a short period of time:

"I never thought I would say that (besides therapy) Cub Scouts has been amazing for my kiddo. Boy, have we been putting the work in to manage my kiddo's selective mutism [anxiety disorder where a person is unable to speak in certain social situations] since he was three and half years old. Therapy and follow ups and practice and 504 plans and so, so, so much mental capacity and energy going into making sure my son would thrive as he grew.

He joined Cub Scouts last year because we were hoping for some hyperlocal relationships because socialization and speaking to kids was hard. We didn't do popcorn sales because, well, you have to speak to people, and we just weren't ready yet.

This year, [my son's] second year in Scouts (age 6) he decided he wanted to sell popcorn. I smiled while thinking, 'this is going to be a disaster that will set us back a year in progress.'

But he marched into his therapist's office and asked me to sit in the waiting room. He said he wanted to learn how to be brave and sell popcorn and it was easier for Dr. An to help him if I wasn't there...

At the end of an hour where they popped a bag of popcorn and walked around the building practicing with strangers by pretending to sell, I pulled his therapist aside out of earshot and she said this was amazing. He wanted to work through his anxiety, recognized the challenge, and was motivated. I asked her what to do if it went horribly. She said that I do it again then, obviously. 'Cool, cool. This is going to be awful,' I thought.

Three weeks ago we did our first storefront. He was scared and barely audible. He got a lot of 'no.' But he got some 'yes' and slowly got louder. And then he wanted to do it again and again. After ten hours of selling popcorn, he can walk up and loudly speak to strangers, sort of carry a conversation, handle 'no's, celebrate successes, and is becoming confident in voice.

Our family is exhausted but we are going out to sell popcorn again this weekend because Aiden wants to hit his goal. And we love hearing him grow into his voice.

I just wanted to share a surprising source of motivation that has made such a big change on our anxiety journey. And a big plug for Scouts... because in a little over a year, it has made all the difference."

## TO HELP OTHER PEOPLE


